

Our canteen is readily available for purchase of food, and respectfully, our front office staff have more important work to do than facilitating such deliveries. I appreciate your support with this.

As many of you will no doubt have already heard, the Victorian Minister for Education recently announced that from the beginning of the 2020 school year, mobile phones will be banned in the yard and in classrooms, and students will be required to keep them in their lockers, should they bring them to school. This is a requirement across all Victorian Government Schools. In consultation with the Kambrya College School Council, we are still in the process of working our way through the development of a new school wide policy in this regard, and we are also developing our implementation plan and reviewing our secure storage infrastructure. At this point in time, I am not yet ready to publicly release these new guidelines, but I will state that the Ministerial Policy will be adhered too. With this in mind, I advised all students at the recent whole school assembly that they should begin to prepare themselves for this change. Whilst I accept that for some students this will be a challenging adjustment, they will indeed survive! ABSENT - End of Year Activity Event on Compass - DET Requirement



Sustainability News: Biodiversity at Kambrya College and at your home

Earlier this year, the Year 10 Environmental Science class undertook a biodiversity audit at our school grounds. Their findings show that we scored 51/100 and many improvements can be made. As part of our 3-year biodiversity plan, we aim to increase the audit score to 80/100 by 2023.

Some of the ways our school can do this are...

- Planting more trees, so we have at least 10 trees per hectare
- Remove more weeds
- Cover at least 80% of the school grounds with organic litter

Currently, we hold annual working bees where attendees have this year planted more plants and maintained some of the school's natural features. The Darrabi students also recently received a grant from Landcare and are working with them to regenerate more areas and plant more indigenous gardens. Some of the areas they have considered are the areas between the school gym and staff carpark, and the area around the shelter space between Bulen and Mirrim. Some ways you can boost your biodiversity at home include mulching gardens to lower evaporation during summer, plant native fauna, don't use weeds chemicals, and feature bird and insect attracting plants Sancha Fung for the Kambrya Sustainability Team



Year 7 SEAL Humanities

"In this semester of Humanities, we learned about a range of topics. Some of the main ones though were: Water in the world; Urbanisation; Place and Liveability. With 'Water in the world' we touched upon the distribution of water, and how it isn't even everywhere. We learnt how to help reduce our water footprint, and all of the indirect and direct water uses that add to the footprint. In 'Urbanisation' we learned about the positive and negative effects of urbanisation, some being the destruction of environmental and agricultural areas, and others being abundant access to resources and education. We also learned about the wastage of resources that urban areas account for. Later, we were educated about 'Place and Liveability' which taught us how urban and rural areas, become liveable for humans. We were taught about what makes a place liveable, and we were taught what it means by your 'place.' Overall this semester we learned a lot of new information that we were unaware of previously."

My class then investigated biomes and food security, these topics were useful to learn, if not the most interesting of subjects. The final unit focusing on the Murray River. "In Semester 2 Humanities, the SEALs studied climate change. We learnt about the dangers of what could happen, should carbon levels increase out of control, and about how it affects the environment and also our societies. We went out on an excursion to Philip Island, where we visited the Nobbies. Known for the fur seals and fairy penguins that frequent the area, while at the Nobbies we learnt about how environmental change is affecting our native species. Also while on the excursion, the classes toured Panny's Chocolate Factory. At the factory, interactive displays, taste tests, and on-





site packing lines showed us the complex and delicious process of turning cocoa pods into chocolate. The tour tied up our previous Humanities unit of the economics of chocolate. In this unit, the SEALs explored how supply and demand of commodities and cash crops applied to everyone's favourite treat. Also in this unit, we investigated the use of child labour in the cocoa industry, and the efforts being made to phase it out. Many of the things we've learnt this year have opened our eyes to both wonderous and not-so-wonderous things in our world and societies, as well as inspired us to make a change in our own lives."
